MEDICAL COMPLICATIONS of Eating Disorders

Patients with eating disorders are at risk for a host of medical complications. Early intervention is essential in the prevention of life-altering, as well as life-threatening, medical problems.



Signs, Symptoms and Complications:

ANOREXIA NERVOSA

- Emaciation
- Bradycardia
- Hypotension
- Dry skin/brittle hair/hair loss
- Amenorrhea- placing patients at risk for infertility, osteopenia and osteoporosis
- Lanugo-growth of fine downy hair
- Yellow skin-carotenemia
- Edema
- Gastrointestinal complications such as irritable bowel syndrome, abdominal pain and chronic constipation
- Lab abnormalities may include life-threatening electrolyte changes, abnormal thyroid function tests, abnormal liver function tests, protein and ketones in the urine, hypercholesterolemia, and decreased white and red blood cell and platelet counts
- Seizures
- Death from cardiac complications

BULIMIA NERVOSA

- Irregular menses
- "Russell's sign" calluses on back of hands
- Parotid gland hypertrophy and irritation
- Dental enamel erosion/Periodontal disease
- Cheilosis-perioral irritation
- Fatigue
- Esophageal disease GERD, Barrett's Esophagus (precancerous lesions on the esophageal lining, pseudo Bartter's syndrome
- Lower GI symptoms pain, bloating, constipation, diarrhea, cathartic colon
- Headaches
- Severe electrolyte abnormalities, metabolic alkalosis and dehydration, as well as hypokalemia, hyponatremia, hypochloremia, hypomagnesemia, and hypocalcemia that can lead to cardiac arrhythmias and sudden death

BINGE EATING DISORDER

- Hypertension
- Gallbladder disease
- High cholesterol
- Type II Diabetes
- Severe abdominal discomfort
- Heart disease
- Kidney stones

- Depression and psychological problems
- Increased risk for cancers of the liver and colon
